
Visit to Lower School News



Exeter Cathedral and Mosque

Year 7 had a fantastic day out to Exeter Cathedral and Exeter Mosque. We are currently learning about Christianity and Islamic beliefs and comparing them. The trip allowed pupils to visualise the differences. We explored all the areas of Exeter Cathedral and all of the pupils couldn't believe how big it was. We explored the history of the Cathedral and looked at the art work on the walls and in the stain glass windows. We had a look at the Cathedral bells and had a chance to recreate the tune using hand bells. The pupils also had the opportunity to dress up in the choir's uniform and as a Bishop. We finished by exploring the different areas around the Cathedral. We then went to the Mosque. When we arrived the first thing we did was all take our shoes off and go into the community hall with Imam to have an introduction to the mosque. He spoke us through their beliefs and the teachings of the Quran. We were then able to sit at the back and observe their noon prayer. It was here that the pupils learnt that the men and women pray separately. After the prayer the Imam recited to us how they are called to prayer. We were also able to see the washing areas that are used by members of the mosque. All pupils commented that they enjoyed the Mosque as it was a very peaceful relaxing place.



SIXTH FORM NEWS

Some of Combe Pafford's Sixth Formers received welcome news after returning from the Christmas holidays. Since the start of 2019, five students have gained jobs or apprenticeships and there are more in the pipeline!

The aim of the Sixth Form is to help get these young adults into meaningful employment, their tailored pathway link to their vocational interests and includes two days every week working in their chosen sector with a business partner linked to the school, many employers are impressed by their hard work and reliability and are keen to offer them permanent positions or apprenticeship opportunities.

Amelia Savage has now left school and has taken up employment at Fermoys Garden Centre; Leon Major has been taken on by Torbay Clearance Services; Jo Ingram has been successful after applying for an Animal Care apprenticeship, as has Jack Baldwin as an apprentice in Premises Maintenance. Two other students, Shannon Gendall and Tom Houghton are just awaiting final offers before they will also be employed. Several other students have gained part time work which fits alongside, continuing to attend their sixth form course and see it as a step towards finding a suitable job.

As part of our commitment to youth employment, we have created ten apprenticeship posts at Combe Pafford and many of our ex apprentices have left and are now employed in posts across the Bay.

We expect more of our students to be successful in this way before the school year ends

We have also just heard that India Dowell has just been offered a childcare apprenticeship at Kiddi Karoo, she is due to start next week!our first child care apprentice success!!

The school itself received recognition of this recently, when we were shortlisted by Exeter College for their annual 'Apprentice and Employer Awards 2019' and attended the awards ceremony on the 8th February. Exeter College work with 964 employers, so we were delighted to win the 'Medium Employer of the Year Award', especially as the independent judging panel included South West Water; Mercedes-Benz SW; Ikea; MB Areospace; and South West Comms.

Food For Life Silver Award

Combe Pafford School has been awarded the Food for Life Silver award for its healthy and climate-friendly food culture.

The school is working with Food for Life to transform the school's food culture and that of its local community by connecting the children with climate-friendly and healthy food.

In its quest to achieve the Food for Life Silver award Combe Pafford serves school meals on plates, not flight trays and has a range of free range, local organic items on the menu. Pupils get to cook and eat the produce they have grown in school. Parents and the wider community get involved too through food themed events such as the annual Combe Pafford School Food Festival.

Combe Pafford is now working towards the Food for Life Gold Award - the ultimate award that recognises schools which use practical learning experiences to reconnect young people to the food they eat following the journey from field to plate.

Rhiannon Alcock, School Nutrition Lead, explains "We are thrilled to have been awarded the Silver Food For Life Award. By joining the Food For Life scheme, we have been able to support our pupils, and parents and carers in understanding the benefits of a balanced and healthy diet, as well as enabling our pupils to have access to a high quality of food within school. Our pupils have been involved in suggesting and implementing changes to the dining hall and the menu, and have the opportunity to learn important life skills linked to growing and harvesting produce and cooking."

Year 10 Visit to the House of Marbles

This term Year 10 pupils have been finding out how sharing experiences with young children can help them to learn. As children learn through investigation, experimenting, exploring and observation, we took a trip to the House of Marbles in Bovey Tracey to do just that!

We investigated how marbles and many other glass ornaments are made in the Glass Works, and experimented with the buttons on the different marble runs which make the marbles go around the run, which we then observed. We completed a brass rubbing trail and experimented with the different crayon techniques to find the best way to complete the rubbings and we explored the House of Marbles garden to find a giant marble, giant games, and a marble well to throw marbles into. We experimented to find the best way to throw the marbles into the well to make them spin in a circular motion, and investigated the Games Museum to find out which toys and games were the oldest. We explored marbles of all shapes and sizes to decide our favourites, and had the opportunity to buy some at the gift shop before we took the minibus back to school.

Swimming

8 pupils from Combe Pafford attended the annual SEN Swimming Gala held at the WESC School in Exeter on the 20th March 2019. This was the first time Combe Pafford had entered a team for some years and it was a great success. Morgan Quinn started a very nervous team off with a 4th place in the 25m Boys Backstroke, followed by Leah Harris coming 2nd in the Girls Backstroke. Charlie Oldham and Jacob Hughes followed Leah's 2nd place with a 2nd of their own in the u15 and senior backstroke.

In the breaststroke, Anya Mae King logged a 4^{th} place, with Jake Brimicombe coming 3^{rd} in the boy's race. Charlie Oldham followed up his success in the backstroke with a solid 2^{nd} place in the seniors breaststroke with Luca James, swimming up an age group coming in 4^{th} in the same race.

Jake Brimicombe swam his heart out in the boys freestyle and was rewarded with a 4th place finish, with Leah Harris finishing 2nd, her second of the day in the girls race. Jacob Hughes finished the freestyle racing off with a 3rd place in the under 17 race. The relays proved successful with Combe Pafford securing their first win of the day in the u15 mixed race, followed up by a second place in the u15 boy's race and the second 1st of the day in the 15 and over race.

Auschwitz

I have just been fortunate enough to participate in a very important visit to Poland with two of our sixth form students, Eddy Hoyte and Rupert Masters. This visit was organised by the Holocaust Educational Trust as part of their 'Lessons From Auschwitz' project. This project aims to educate students about the Holocaust and its continuing relevance. The project has four separate parts to it; an orientation seminar, a visit to Auschwitz-Birkenau, a follow up

seminar and then a 'Next Steps' project. So far we have completed the first two parts of the project and are due to attend the follow up seminar on Sunday 24th February.

The visit to Auschwitz-Birkenau on Wednesday 13th February started very early with a check-in at Exeter airport at five in the morning. We were all a little bleary eyed but pleased to be on our way. We boarded our flight full of other students from various schools in our region and took the opportunity to read some of the information the Trust had given us. We were all interested in how the day would proceed and aware that it might be a day

that was shocking and emotionally draining.

Our first stop in Poland was in the town of Auschwitz. We visited the town square and were given the information that before World War II 58% of the population were Jewish. Now there are no Jews. Of course, it is no coincidence that the town is located right next door to the Auschwitz work and death camps. It was poignant to hear about the thriving Jewish community that had been such a large and important part of this community since the 15th century, simply disappearing to nothing.

We set off then with some trepidation towards the Auschwitz work camp. Here we walked beneath the words 'Arbeit Macht Frei' and made our way inside. We visited a number of the buildings here and saw sights that were

unimaginable. Our guide talked to us about some of those who had gone there to work, many surviving only two months in the savage and inhumane conditions. We saw suitcases with names emblazoned on them, shoes and glasses piled high-all belonging to those who had been killed. These were unforgettable sights.

Our final destination of the day was Auschwitz-Birkenau. This is the site where roughly 1 million Jews were killed. Much of the site now lies in rubble either destroyed by the Nazis as the Allies came closer at the end of the war or fallen to ruin as time passes. We were able to stand at the sorting area, knowing from our guide that many left here and walked straight to their deaths in the gas chambers. We were able to stand by the ruins of a gas chamber and crematorium. We saw pictures rescued from the debris of prisoners who had undoubtedly been murdered at the site. It is an utterly bleak and desolate place.



We have two more parts of the project to complete. I am certain that both Rupert and Eddy will treat these with the same maturity, thoughtfulness and respect as they treated everything they saw on that important day in Poland. Our message and the message of the Lessons From Auschwitz Project is that those that perished should never be forgotten. To remember them is to ensure it is never allowed to happen again.
