The first is how well our children and young people do when they work hard to make the most of their skills and abilities. This can be seen by reading the account of the Leavers Presentation Evening (page 11) where our year 11 pupils had their achievements formally recognised through subject awards and where Ben Mee of Dartmoor Zoo presented their Records of Achievement. Ben has several mottos..... 'Never Give Up'.....'If you give up you fail'..... and 'I'm going to keep going until I can't go any further'...... really good advice when you are think about being successful and achieving!

This intent can also be seen by reading about the amazing success of this year's sixth form students (page 12), where a staggering 80% of those leaving us gained employment, apprenticeship or supported internship.....considering the national average for youngsters with an EHCP is around 6%, this really is an outstanding result which also reflects Ben's attitude.

This determination is further reflected in the success of our own apprentices....in June we received an award from Exeter College as the best medium sized employer in the area and have now been asked to become an Apprentice Ambassador (page 17).

The second is the wide range of residential experiences the staff of the school offer all pupils. Year after year, the staff give freely of their time to offer every child the chance to develop their personal and social skills and widen their experiences by taking them away from home.....you will read of various accounts inside which could not happen without the commitment of the staff to offer this, there will not be many schools which offer every child such an opportunity every year. I am sure you join me in sincerely thanking them for their support.

Finally, whilst it isn't the buildings and grounds which make a school, we are fortunate that we can continue to develop both as they enable us to provide children with a setting which promotes the aims of the school and give the messages we want children and young people to take on board. Our vocational facilities clear do this. I am pleased to report that during the summer holidays an Astroturf pitch is being installed and this will allow us to develop further sport, PE and games and the healthy messages it will bring.

We are also planning to extend the sixth form building as the success students have has made it a popular option post 16 and the initial 30 place building is being developed to enable 50 to benefit.

Here the river was massive and so much bigger than the tiny stream we saw at the start of the day. It was great putting all we learnt into real life on our trip.





# Year 8 Belgium Trip



Year 8 pupils had a residential to savour as they deepened their understanding of World War One with a trip to Belgium. Some 25 pupils arrived at school eager to start their six-hour journey to Dover on board our coach.

Smooth seas on the one-and-a-half hour ferry crossing meant the voyage to France was an enjoyable one as the children sat outside in the sunshine enjoying the sea air. We eventually arrived at our hostel at 8pm having completed our 11-hour journey and it was time for some much needed dinner before everyone settled into their rooms and eventually fell asleep.

The first full day saw the group descend on In Flanders Museum which featured an interactive display reflecting the scale and horror of the First World War. Next we visited Tyne Cot cemetery, which is the resting place of 11,954 soldiers of the Commonwealth Forces. It is the largest number of burials contained in any Commonwealth cemetery of either the First or Second World War. The children found a number of graves belonging to soldiers from the Torbay area and paid their respects by resting crosses on the graves. Following this, we headed off to the German cemetery, Langemark – one of only four First World War German cemeteries in the Flanders region. The children were shocked at how different it was to Tyne Cot with each grave containing at least four fallen German soldiers. In the evening pupils took a trip to the eagerly-awaited chocolate shop where the owner was waiting with a special offer for some very excited children. Soon after snapping up the tasty treats, the group descended on Menin Gate for the nightly act of homage ceremony, which saw Corey Pollard, Angel Hartley-Galvin and Bradley Kersey lay a wreath on behalf of the school.

The following morning we set off for Essex Farm Cemetery where the children had chance to explore another cemetery. It was created at the time the Canadian field artillery established a small, basic dressing station to tend to wounded casualties in the vicinity. British casualties who died near the location of Essex Farm were buried in this cemetery. The day also included a trip to the memorial museum Passchendaele where the replica dugout rooms are located in the cellars, with the first floor housing the museum reception and temporary exhibitions. Outside of the museum there is an impressive replica network of trenches, which gave the children a unique insight into how trenches were built and what they looked like. After lunch and a play on the grass outside the museum, we headed off to explore Hill 60 – the scene of one of the fiercest battlegrounds in the Great War. The evening was spent with a trip to the local bowling alley where a fiercely-contested showdown ended with Mr Newton sealing top spot (much to the horror of Miss Moor).

The final full day was spent at Bellewaerde Theme Park where the children enjoyed a number of nerveshredding rides, including the upside down rollercoaster. That evening offered some time to relax and enjoy each other's company before the children packed their suitcases ahead of an early departure the next morning. A group of exhausted children were reunited with their parents the next evening back in Torquay at the end of what was a hugely successful residential. Special mention must go to the children, whose behaviour was impeccable during the entire trip. Well done Year 8.

Pupils found out about the dangers of single use plastic and the damage it is doing to our marine wildlife. The pictures above show how marine life is affected by plastic which is often eaten which leads inevitably to their death. In school pupils took part in a variety of different activities such as surveys and interviews to find out how much rubbish we recycle at Combe Pafford and where it goes. We discovered that Combe Pafford is very good at recycling and that recycling happens across every area of school, not just in our classrooms! We found out that areas that also recycle well are the Yellow Frog café, the IT team and animal care.



At the end of the week pupils were determined to limit their use of plastic and to collect litter they find on their local beaches.



# Pear 9 Trip Dartmoor Erison Museum

On Friday 7th June, Year 9 travelled to Dartmoor prison museum to investigate and learn about what life was like in Dartmoor prison through the past decades since it opened. We learnt that originally, it was used as a prisoner of war camp and captured soldiers were brought here to work. After that it was opened to convicts, and is still a functioning prison to this day. At present there are 627 prisoners in Dartmoor prison. Our guide Paul then showed us around the perimeter of the prison, and the cemetery, where there are memorials for the soldiers who died whilst incarcerated at the prison.

At the museum, there are lots of artefacts including old prison record books, photographs of prisoners and the wardens, and a collection of contraband items including handmade tattoo guns and mobile phones! It was a fun day, and we can't wait to use our learning from the day in our humanities lessons this term.

### Forensics Day

On Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> July, an emergency assembly was called to share the shocking news that there had been an incident in the science labs! Fortunately, we had a group of well-trained forensic experts in Year 9 who were able to collect and analyse the evidence in the crime scene whilst investigating the tragic death of Mr Wallace.

The fictitious murder of Mr Wallace was investigated with great eagerness and desire to catch the perpetrator. 
A fantastic evening was enjoyed by all and I wish all of Year

vegetables from start to finish. Thank you to Occombe Farm for the use of the poly tunnel and tools.




#### Sixth Form Student Voice

# Sixth Form Round-Up

We have seen an unprecedented level of success by students in 2018-19 with many students gaining apprenticeships or leaving to take paid employment, some interviewing successfully to go on to the Aspire programme at Torbay Hospital, and one student being accepted into the army (see more details below). Success breeds success, as they say, and I can only hope that this success rubs off on to next year's cohort as we expand the sixth form, planning as we are to open our doors in September to just over 50 students for the first time. It has been a busy year in the sixth form, and in addition to the main work of supporting students into work and to achieve as high a level as they can in their core subjects, a lot of other exciting projects have been going on. Here is a round-up of some of those activities:

#### **JESSY ACCEPTED BY ARMY**

Jessy Motteram has been eyeing up a place in the army in recent months, and after attending a number of familiarisation days and briefings, finally got the word that he would need to travel to Pirbright Barracks at Brookwood in Surrey to attend a 2-day assessment. This consisted of an array of physical tests, maths, English and cognitive tests, and a medical, which, according to Jessy, not all of them passed as several of the 30-strong group



dropped out along the way and went home. Jessy emerged successful, no doubt helped by his Ten Tors experience and having climbed the Three Peaks last year to raise money for Rowcroft Hospice, and has been accepted into the Royal Armoured Corps. He starts his basic training at Winchester on August 11th. This is an absolutely fabulous achievement and he becomes only the third student in over 30 years from this school to make it into the army. One of Jessy's fellow students, Rupert Masters successfully survived a taster week with the Army at Okehampton Army Camp back in Year 11. Jessy was supported in his preparation for the army assessment by his Job Coach Sam Yeates, and is now looking



forward to getting started! He starts on a salary of around £15,000 per year.



# Reminder to parents Unauthorised Absence

It is important to keep school informed if your child is going to be absent as soon as possible at the start of the day. We have a clear process for you to follow to inform us if your child will not be attending. Not informing us of the reason why your child is not in school will be marked as unauthorised in the register.

In situations where a child accumulates 10 or more unauthorised absences (the equivalent of 5 school days) within any six-month period, parents/carers will make themselves liable to receiving a Penalty Notice per parent/carer, per child.

The Penalty Notice carries a penalty of £60 if paid in full within 21 days or £120 if paid in full after this time but within 28 days. We are unable to accept part or late payments and there is no legal right to appeal the Penalty Notice once it has been issued. If a Penalty Notice goes unpaid, this is likely to result in Court proceedings being taken against you for an offence of failing to ensure regular school attendance contrary to section 444 Education Act 1996. If convicted, you may face a fine of up to £2500 and/or a maximum 3 months imprisonment.

<u>Please note:</u> only <u>one</u> Penalty Notice will be issued <u>in any two year period</u>. This means that if a Penalty Notice is paid, and the child accumulates a further 10 sessions of unauthorised absence (5 school days), this will result in the parent/carer receiving a summons to Court for an offence contrary to s444 Education Act. The matter <u>cannot</u> be dealt with by way of a further Penalty Notice being issued.


