

So, what is oracy and why is it important at Combe Pafford?

Recently, Combe Pafford School has been working on the development of oracy across the school. Oracy covers the skills that pupils need to help them communicate effectively with others in order to learn to, and to learn through speak. This is because research tells us that speaking and listening skills are essential for social mobility, good mental health, good cognition and learning, development good relationships and building self-esteem.

In addition to the support we are providing in lessons, we are appealing to parents and carers to engage in similar activities at home, which will further improve their skills. There are several things that could be done to support your child's speaking and listening development at home, such as:

- Having high expectations for your child's responses to your questions these can be supported by sentence.
- Allow children time to think and respond
- Demonstrate speaking in clear sentences
- Playing games that develop speaking and listening skills i.e. 'Would you rather?'



Year 8 at Escot

On Monday 27th January 2020, Year 8 went to visit the living histories Saxon village at Wildwood Escot in Ottery St Mary. After escaping from the Maize Maze, we had a fantastic day learning about how the Anglo-Saxons lived; how they made their food, how



they made tools and toys, how they made coins and paid for things, and exploring what their houses and shelters were like. We made bread in the cob oven and a clothes pin in the forge, we even wrote in magical Anglo-Saxon Runes.



Despite the rain and cold, we also got to see some amazing animals including wolves, red foxes, birds of prey, otters, lynx and boars! There are six wolves at Escot who have come from Sweden. We were really lucky to get up so close to them.



Year 8 Spring Term.

Our in school learning has been very exciting this term, on top of our interesting everyday learning we enjoyed taking part in World Book Day and Science Week. For World Book Day, we enjoyed dressing up and sharing stories before all three classes decorated their doors to show their love of animals, with 85 doing the Jungle Book and 8P and 8W making an Animal Kingdom themed doorway.

As part of Science Week, pupils enjoyed having the

chance to get creative and try some different experiments. 85 did a slime themed Ghostbusters



video, 8P focused on special effects from a Christmas Carol and 8W made a jewelled giant crab and a glow-inthe-dark giant crab from Moana.

A highlight for staff and students was our trip to Escot Living History Village as part of our humanities topic. (See separate article for photos from the day). We have also managed to squeeze in some other trips in the local area to practise our road safety skills and 8W visited the beach, to practice Beach Safety as part of our Lifeskills learning.

HORTICULTURE



All pupils are working hard and progressing well in Horticulture. They are working towards their City and Guilds Level 1 Award, Certificate or Diploma in Practical Horticulture Skills. The Year 10s are gaining new skills and have already passed some units. Year 11 pupils have almost completed their 8 units, and some will even have extra units towards the Diploma, which will be especially useful if they join the Horticulture pathway in the Sixth Form. The Sixth Formers are working steadily through their Diploma Units, and have the added bonus of gaining

extra experience in Coleton Fishacre National Trust gardens every other week. We have been very busy maintaining the school grounds this season; generally weeding

and mulching the different areas. We have also raised money for additional equipment and perishables such as seeds and compost through the Valentine's Day roses and Mother's Day flowers. Our biggest news is that the governors have kindly funded a Billy Goat Leaf Vacuum to make our maintenance of the Astroturf quicker and easier. It is a large petrol machine and is a very welcome addition to our fleet of 5 mowers, 5 strimmers, 5 leaf litter blowers and 2 small leaf vacuums. We received operating training from Devon Garden Machinery, which was exciting for the pupils. The



pupils really enjoy learning how to use the machinery, and the machinery units really enrich the course.





Vocational Skills. Year 4 to Year 9

Again, a busy term in our vocational skills department. We have had many projects going on such as stick man model railways being built, cardboard marble jumps, wooden pen pots and wooden cup coasters.



Lower school have been making cardboard marble jumps, which have given us the opportunity to work safely with tools such as scissors and hot glue guns. Pupils



have enjoyed the challenge of making these jumps independently with very little adult help! We



have had some fantastic designs for our completed finished jumps. In year 7, pupils have been working on woodwork and carpentry skills by building a bird feeder. This has been a challenging task as it has



involved skills such as measuring and marking and cutting timber. Pupils have been working safely with tools and they have been working hard on their independence. Be ready with your



tools at home to hang these in your outside areas when pupils bring them home! Year 8 have been completing a variety of projects including wooden children's models and a



model railway! Year 8 have been focused on a variety of different tasks and through these



tasks, they have shown that they are improving on making independent decisions and perseverance. Year 9 have been really busy trying different option choices ready



for their options in September. They have had a chance to have a first go at picking their



first 3 option subjects and an extra... Just in case! Year 9 will have the opportunity to make their final choices before summer half term even, if we are still off!! Unfortunately, we were all



brought to an abrupt end to the term and some projects are not complete yet. Do not worry, they are still in the clipboards and can be completed when we return. In the meantime, I am sending work home to pupils during the time that we are off so that you can all keep practicing the essential skills needed to increase your choices in the future.

Level 1 City and Guilds Construction



This term has seen us complete our unit on painting a panel door with lots of success. We have been making amazing progress on the health and safety unit which, if am honest, can be a bit tedious. All the pupils have worked really hard on this and

making fantastic progress on it. We would have liked to have that unit completed by the summer but we will see how we go with the current situation. We have been running 3 units together for most of this term: Mixing and using concrete, laying a gravel path and laying slabs. Fantastic progress made so far!! 
I certainly cannot let this Spring Term's newsletter go by without wishing our Head Teacher, Mr. Lock, another huge congratulations from all the staff at Combe Pafford School.

As you will all know by now, Mr. Lock received an OBE in the New Year's Honours list "for services to

children with special educational needs and disabilities". On January 8th, we celebrated the news with a whole school assembly where myself and Mr Thompson explained the amazing work that Mr Lock has led over the years, with a variety of 'then' and 'now' photos, which have transformed the buildings of Combe Pafford School and the lives of hundreds of children.

On the right you will see Mr. Lock on his OBE throne during the assembly and on the left below he is cutting his 'CONGRATULATIONS' cake that was organised by the School Council, who delivered a speech of thanks to Mr. Lock and presented him with an OBE biscuit medal! It was particularly pleasing to see a special guest arrive; an ex-pupil and wonderful young man, Panay Karamanlis, who eloquently explained his journey through Combe Pafford to the whole school and thanked Mr. Lock for the opportunities that Combe Pafford has given him which enabled him to achieve employment in the Hospitality and Catering industry and now with the NHS. Panay is one of hundreds of success





stories who have gone through our school and onto employment as a direct result of Mr. Lock's leadership.

Mr Lock began working at Combe Pafford School over 30 years ago and became the Head Teacher in January 1994. The transformation of the school has been incredible and can be seen in the site photos at the end of this article. Through various funding opportunities, we have developed many state of the art facilities with many for the teaching of work related learning, which has benefitted our pupils immensely. These include our Yellow Frog Café, Motor Vehicle Garage, Construction workshop, Reptile House, Animal Ark, Hairdressing salon and our new astro turf pitch. Mr Lock is now planning to improve our provision further with even more excellent facilities for your children with the development of our on-site horticulture provision and a purpose-built Music room.

pupils to get a job and become valued employees and get on the first rung of the ladder; arguably the most important one! Consequently, our Sixth Form programmes, work placements and employer focused support have a real impact and many pupils leave school into meaningful paid employment or apprenticeships and with it an increased positive life chance (86% of our Sixth Form students achieved employment, apprenticeships or internships last summer; the national average for people with learning difficulties in employment is less than 6%). This success in turn informs younger pupils and raises their aspirations.

Mr Lock has also made international links with other schools including China, Costa Rica and Nigeria. An annual trip to China has taken place for our children for over a decade; a wonderful life experience for

the pupils to develop awe, wonder and appreciation of the wider world in which we live. The trip includes visiting vocational schools and working in classes with Chinese students, which again raises aspirations to gain employment and lead purposeful, successful lives.

On Thursday 5th March, Mr. Lock travelled with his wife and two sons to Buckingham Palace, to meet

with many other successful people who had been honoured by the Queen. He received his OBE from the Queen's eldest son and heir to the throne, Prince Charles, who thanked him for his hard work over the years towards vocational provision (something Prince Charles is also very passionate about) and hoped the honour represented a small thank you. Mr. Lock shared his experience with us all in a whole school assembly on his return and said he thought of us all when he had his first drink in the Palace after receiving his award.

From a personal point of view, I met Mr. Lock over 11 years ago when working for a local primary school when we were developing school links through vocational skills. I saw then his integrity, vision, positivity and commitment with every decision being made for the benefits of children. I have been very fortunate to work and learn closely from him over the last eight years and have seen these qualities each day. His passion and personal drive to provide the very best possible service for your children is incredible. He is one of a kind!



The school would not be the success it is today without Mr. Lock's determination and I am sure you will join me and the staff in saying a huge congratulations to him on this wonderful achievement. We are all absolutely delighted. WELL DONE!

Sixth Formers enjoy sampling Italian cuisine!




A group of about ten sixth formers thoroughly enjoyed our last social event, which was an evening at Pizza Express in Torquay where we were

Sixth Form activities curtailed by Coronavirus

I don't think any of us could have quite predicted the situation we now find ourselves in, and it has inevitably resulted in us having to cancel a huge array of things we had been planning as well as the fact that 'School's Out' rather earlier than usual for Easter (and may be beyond that). First to go was the trip to Poland that two of our sixth formers Ness Raybould and Jake Vizard in W1 were booked on with Mrs Dolan to see the concentration camps at Auschwitz and Birkenau as part of the government's Lessons from Auschwitz project. That was quickly followed by the cancellation of the residential to Rome in June/July, which 18 students (and 4 staff) were very much looking forward to. Most recently, the army made the hard decision to cancel the Ten Tors event this year (the only other time Ten Tors has been cancelled in advance of the event was in 2001 when we had the Foot and Mouth outbreak to deal with that affected our countryside so badly). We had four keen sixth formers already training for that - Jake Vizard, Thomas Hocking, Jasmine Coward and Kane Cousins. We had just heard news of the success of three sixth formers - Joe Weiss, Thomas Hocking and Devon Smail - in securing scholarships from the Sir Francis Chichester Trust worth nearly £2000. Each were to attend 3-week long Outward Bound courses in centres of their choice in Wales, the Lake District and Scotland over the summer. The future of this remains uncertain to say the least. So to say the disappointment on everyone's part is tangible, is an understatement. Students, quite understandably, feel devastated.

It is however challenging times like these that bring out the best in people and we must stay in touch with students and think creatively about how we work around these problems and support students as best we can. Of real concern is the cancellation of public examinations in the summer (although roll-on, roll-off exams such as Functional Skills may not be affected) and the temporary halt put on work placements and the interruption to the very good progress many students have made towards being work-ready and being able to secure a job or an apprenticeship. As we know, so many businesses (particularly in the hospitality and retail sectors) will be affected, meaning that it will not be a good time to look for the very jobs and apprenticeships we encourage our students to apply for. In some cases, it may make some Year 12/13 students re-evaluate their decision to leave in June. We must also work hard to support Year 14 and other leavers at a most difficult time for the economy. With so much uncertainty however, we must trust ourselves to help each other and move forwards until the horizon is clear. I have every confidence that students can rise to the challenge, with the support of sixth form staff. For the duration of the lockdown therefore, I would encourage both students and parents to keep in touch and share their thoughts and concerns by contacting Mrs Milner or myself at ethompson@combepafford.torbay.sch.uk or cmilner@combepafford.torbay.sch.uk and we will reply as soon as possible.

I hope you all manage to stay sane during the restrictions we have been asked to observe and that your families remain well. Work should already be arriving by email to you for your son/daughter to complete (it is also being sent to students' Combe Pafford email address) and we ask all parents and carers to encourage students to follow a routine (even if it involves a morning lie-in!) and to engage with the work that we have sent - this is really very important. I would also encourage all students to read every day, to have some form of exercise within the government restrictions, and to stay in touch with staff. The immediate weeks and months are going to be tricky but the future is still bright!
