Obviously, the work this term has been dictated by the need to try to keep everyone safe and consequently several of the visits and activities we would normally undertake this term have had to be cancelled.

Thankfully, since September, some sort of normality has returned and we have settled into new routines and classes and lessons really well, whilst some activities have been curtailed, others, such as cycling, have really flourished! There have been other highlights as you will see in the rest of the newsletter, one worthy of note is the work we do with apprentices through our apprenticeship scheme which I am pleased to report has been recognised

by becoming the Regional Winners at the National Apprenticeship Awards, we then progressed onto the National Apprenticeship Award Final for Small and Medium Employers. Whilst we did not win, we were really pleased to be in the Final, one of only 8 companies to do so. This caused us to reflect on how many apprentices we have had, we have 9 at the moment, but in total, we have had 42 since we began recruiting apprentices.

During the term, we have had to ask some children to isolate as a precaution as they have had contact with a positive case, whilst this of course is really regrettable, I am pleased to report we haven't (yet!?) had an incident where any pupil or staff member has caught the virus in school......consequently I would like to thank everyone for the way we have all tried to stick to our rules and plans and washed hands, kept a distance and walked outside between lessons, often the long way around the building, and to parents and carers, friends and grandparents for helping with transport......a real team effort!!

As we look forward to the Christmas holidays, can I ask parents and carers to keep informing us of any pupil who, when the holiday begins, develops symptoms within 48 hours of being in school or has a positive test up to Wed 23rd December by emailing emails@combepafford,torbay.sch.uk this will ensure we can properly investigate anyone who may have been in contact in school and may need to isolate.

Sadly, the expectation is that there may well be more cases as a result of Christmas get togethers, so please do not send your youngster back to school on Tuesday 5th January if they, or anyone in the household, have symptoms or has had a positive test.

I hope you have the best Christmas/New Year holiday possible in the circumstances......I am sure we are all wishing for a much better 2021!!



At the start of term, two of the Sixth Form Job Coaches set about taking out between 2 – 4 students from the Preparation for Working Life programme every week to get used to catching the bus to nearby towns and modelling the skills needed to do this independently. Second lockdown interrupted this process, but not before we had taken 20 youngsters out for their first experience, visiting a range of places, including Teignmouth, Newton Abbot, Torquay, Paignton and Totnes. We hope to resume this later on in the school year as it provides an important first step towards being able to travel independently.

Damon branches out!

Damon Barlow has benefited this term from two new ventures we have been able to put his way. Firstly, he is halfway through a block of 6 days spent 1-to-1 with a tutor from Adelong Outdoor Education working on personal development skills such as map reading and navigation. So far he has been to Berry Head Country Park and Coleton Fishacre National Trust property to put his skills into practice, and hopes to be able to gain an award for this. Damon has been an enthusiastic participant and is very much enjoying these sessions. Alongside this, Damon has attended two taster sessions at The Key at Seale Hayne on the KAOS Project — this is an expressive arts workshop which involves collaborative group work with other students on visual arts and drama, which is just up Damon's street!! He has enjoyed the taster so much that we have decided to allow him to continue attending on Thursdays throughout the Spring term.

Ben is a safe, sensible driver and has already investigated what he needs to do to achieve his long-term dream — which is to gain his Heavy Goods Vehicle licence so he can become a lorry driver. It does also mean of course that he can apply for jobs as a delivery driver. Well done Ben!



Employability

A new subject has appeared on the timetable this term for Work-ready students in the form of Employability, and is being jointly delivered by the W tutors Miss Monnington and Mrs Dolan. This subject has replaced I.T. and Work-related Learning, and the three lessons each week are dedicated to educating students about the workplace, and developing the skills and knowledge needed to look for, apply for and gain suitable employment and apprenticeships. We are confident in the long term

that this will mean that more students will be successful in gaining casual part-time employment and more full-time jobs and apprenticeships. Rosie Underhill, our own apprentice in the Sixth Form, recently did her own presentation to W1 and W2 students about what life was like as an apprentice and the work she has to do on her college day at Exeter College. Sarah Ross, an ex-Sixth Form student, is also an apprentice lower down the school.




Remembrance Day
