I am glad to say that we returned in September to a much more normal routine and you will read in this newsletter some of the activities and visits we have been able to undertake.



We also returned to a brand new music room which has proven to be a real asset to the school and given a boost to both the teaching of music and its use at lunchtimes. It has been created in the middle of the school using a disused courtyard and wasn't an easy build and I am extremely grateful to M W Benney the builder who overcame several challenges but still managed to deliver the building on time and on budget! M W Benney are also constructing our new horticultural Centre, which we hope will be completed in the Easter holidays.

I am delighted to report that several sixth form students have picked up apprenticeships and employment since leaving in July and this has continued this term where we have seen students leave us having found employment. To add to this we were pleased to hear that we had once again been voted Regional Winner in the Small and Medium Employer of the Year Awards through the National Apprenticeships Service, as well as winner in the Recruitment Excellence section.

The autumn term is when we begin the planning for the residential visits we undertake in the summer term. Obviously such visits have been a victim of the Covid pandemic and we have needed to cancel many such opportunities over the past 18 months. We are hopeful that we may be able to offer some this summer, we have

taken the decision that all of our visits will need to be in the UK to give them the best possible chance of taking place, as well as Governors deciding that the maximum cost to parents and carers this year will be £150 with the school paying any costs over this. Further details will follow when staff have collated interest, but please be assured, in the event of a planned residential needing to be cancelled at short notice, all parents and carers will receive a full refund of any money paid.

I have tried to avoid mentioning Covid too much as I am sure we are all fed up with it and the difficulties and restrictions it brings. However, we are mindful that when school reopens in January we need to be prepared to keep everyone as safe as we can and limit the opportunities for anyone to bring it into school and cause in-school transmission. If you haven't yet replied to the specific email regarding testing in January could I urge you to do so asap, this will help with planning.

If you need to visit school could I ask that you test before visiting and wear a mask whilst on the premises. It may be necessary to conduct Annual Review meetings either by zoom or phone, we will make that decision next term when the situation is clearer, meetings are much better face to face so I am reluctant to make the change if we can avoid it.

Finally, can I wish you all a very merry and happy Christmas and New Year and hope you and your families stay safe and well

4N & 5P





7/C





Pupils have studied the slave trade, segregation and then learnt about key individuals and events both past and present that have highlighted and challenged inequality and racism in our society. Pupils completed their own research and



presented this to Mr Lock and Mrs Bradfield who issued



awards to those who demonstrated excellent understanding of the topics covered. An impressive display has been created to support others with their understanding of black history.


Teachers man of the match – Jordan, who was fearless in defence and kept their tricky striker quiet for long periods.

Science News

Fume cupboard

We have been fortunate to gain funding from the Royal Society of Chemistry for a fume cupboard at Combe Pafford. It has been used to demonstrate

the **sublimation** (solid to gas) of lodine to a group of year 10 pupils embarking on



the foundation AQA GCSE chemistry course this year. The Pupils were able to observe lodine as a solid and then sublime, predicting what colour they thought the gas would be whilst making careful observations of the change of state. They were pleasantly surprised by the purple gas and the crystal formation on the side of the flask. Being able to demonstrate



properties of elements rather than through videos makes the learning more exciting and contextual for our pupils.

Swimming at Combe Pafford

As a school we are very passionate about improving pupils' skills both inside and outside of the classroom.


We have a set a target to ensure that all pupils will be able to swim with independence before they leave the Middle School.

A year 11 Hospitality and Catering group visited Brixham fish market in November to get an insight into what happens at the market. Many thanks to Adam Mudge who took the time from his busy day to show us all around the Quay and market. The students asked good questions and learnt some interesting facts:

- The Market landed £40,000,000 (Millon pounds) worth of fish last year
- Employs 57 people and for every one person employed at the market, there are 8 additional
 jobs connected with and support the market (electricians, mechanics, fitters, engineers etc.)
- It costs a whopping £3,000,000 to buy, fit-out and license an average size fishing trawler
- Most popular fish landed is Dover sole, not Cod, as most of us thought! Cod is found in colder waters such as the North Atlantic or the coast off of Scotland and Norway.
- The market produces their own ice which is made by a machine which was funded by the EU.

We were shown around inside the market, students got to see large tubs of fish containing an array of various fish, some students even held a live lobster and a rock crab!


Excellent effort once again Combe Pafford!

Grease - The Musical!



Students rise to the challenge on Teambuilding Days






Barrie Setchfield crossing the River Dart via the stepping stones on the teambuilding day on Dartmoor


Students take advantage of off-site fitness and leisure opportunities




paid money to tell jokes. In total we raised £60 towards the Children in Need cause. Well done everyone for having a go!

the time we returned to school for the Christmas quiz, giving out of reward vouchers, and of course Secret Santa.


