COVID Update

We have now been issued with the following new guidance which came into effect from 1^{st} April. The key piece of information which I am sure you will be aware of, is the end of routine testing/reporting which we have become accustomed to over the past months.

This means we will no longer be testing pupils in school nor providing any test kits, neither will be asking school staff to test twice a week as they have been doing consistently for several months. Hopefully, we have now turned a corner and testing and face masks will become a thing of the past, but obviously COVID hasn't disappeared completely and should your youngster have symptoms, we ask that you please keep them at home for at least 3 days and especially if they have a high temperature.

Can I thank you for your support and understanding over the past months, and hope we are now at the beginning of a summer without testing, face masks and isolating.

I have listed the main points of the guidance below, Mike Lock Head

The latest DfE guidance is summarised below:

- We are now to protect those most vulnerable and learn to live with COVID COVID is now
 just one of many respiratory illnesses
- We should no longer test pupils/adults either routinely or if symptomatic
- Children should only test if advised by a health professional
- Pupils and staff should not attend school if unwell with symptoms specifically a high temperature and not return until the high temperature has subsided. Adults should remain at home for 5 days and children under 18 for 3 days.
- Asymptomatic testing is no longer recommended.
- Schools should retain any unused testing kits but not distribute to staff/pupils without PHE guidance.
- Previous COVID guidance has now been withdrawn
- Now we mix in open society the benefit of regular testing is no longer as effective in preventing onward transmission it is more effective to be vaccinated
- If a parent sends a pupil in with symptoms schools should not test them but request the parent collects the child and they stay at home. Schools can refuse for the pupil to be in school to protect onward transmission


6E and 5R

6E and 5R enjoyed a virtual tour of the building, hosted by two knowledgeable tour guides. We were lucky enough to see both chambers and even saw the spot above where Guy Fawkes himself was located by the Kings Guards!



Year 7 News

In Year 7, as part of RE, we have been learning about Hinduism. In March Hinduis celebrate the Holi festival which many of us would recognise as the festival using lots of bright powder paints! We loved throwing powder paints at each other. Everyone had a big smile on their face!



Year 7 were all lucky enough to go on an exciting day trip to the Eden Project. We were



blessed with lovely weather and all had an excellent day. When we arrived all pupils were really excited to see the massive biomes that look like giant bubbles and we found out that it took 2 and a half years to construct in 2001. We took part in a rainforest uncovered workshop

and pupils were exposed to the life of the Kombai tribe in Papua New Guinea. We were put into small groups and became a research tribe, before we could start we decided as a group the most important things for survival in the rainforest, put together a kit and create a tribal mark that we then put on our hands or faces using face paint. We then had a focus in our tribe to identify plants within the rainforest biome







that would help the tribe with their survival whether that was a plant for food, a plant used for shelter or a plant that would help them with sourcing water and medicines. Within the biome Year 7 were able to experience a rainforest (without the plane journey) and I think when we left we could all agree on one thing the rainforest was very, very hot! We also discovered a world of animals and plants and got to feel the leaves and see the size of leaves like those found on a banana tree or on a coco de mer plant. On return to our classroom each tribe shared their findings and secrets to survival in the rainforest!



7H have had a fantastic second term of school. Everyone has progressed in their learning and it's been lovely to see. We absolutely loved the Science week activities that we participated in. Pupils were able to investigate forces in action, learn about birds of prey, and get a closer look at space through the space dome that was brought into school. It was a perfect way to bring our learning in Science lessons to life. In our Humanities lessons this term, we have been learned about rainforests around the world, and the Maya civilisation. Recently we were able to visit the Eden Project, where the plants, climate, and people we have been learning about came to life. By spending a day at the Eden Project, we had the chance to take a guided tour through a large rainforest greenhouse, and then get to use tools and household items that tribes living in the rainforests would use every day. Pupils were really engaged and thoroughly enjoyed it, but the most common question by far was "does it have to be so hot in here?!" Finally, in R.E pupils have been learning about Hinduism. We had our own Holi Festival, and I cannot tell you how excited 7H were to throw paint at me! It has been an amazing second term for 7H.

Animal Care

Animal care has welcomed new animals this term, Leo the lop eared lion headed rabbit, Marshmellow, Rolo, Cookie and Teddy the guinea pigs and Frederick the horned frog! All the animal care pupils have been working hard to learn about what the frog needs in his diet and habitat to lead a healthy life! 



8C News










8C Trips


9A Spring term update

We've had a busy time in 9A this term! The boys have been really enjoying our work on William Shakespeare's The Tempest and have just produced some fantastic stories about the origins of the character Caliban, as well as some brilliant newspaper reports of the sinking of King Alonso's ship. Their writing has really improved this term and we are really proud of their efforts.

In Humanities we have been studying the Titanic and I have been blown away by the facts and knowledge that the class have about the incident. They have just produced some brilliant board games for the end of the project and I was so impressed with their game ideas and the effort they put in to creating their board games.

One of the top facts we learnt that surprised us was that the Titanic was actually on fire before it set sail! There was a fire burning in one of the coal bunkers which White Star line knew about BUT they didn't want to delay the sailing of the Titanic's maiden voyage and so they allowed the ship to sail anyway. We learnt that White star line tried to cover this up at the inquiry into the disaster and also that the hull of the ship may have been able to withstand the impact of the collision with the iceberg if the metal hadn't been weakened by the fire!





9K & 9S - The Tempest

In English this term, 9K have been learning about Shakespeare. As a class they have created some fantastic pieces writing based on 'The Tempest' play script. In addition to 9K this. created short а production of their own, re-writing the famous Shakespearean play



producing a more modern piece. 9K used modern songs that linked well to their characters in order to explain the story to a younger audience. They then performed their play during a Middle School Assembly which was a big hit! They worked incredibly well as a team and gave some fantastically convincing individual performances which won them class of the term! Well done 9K!



95 have been practising their performance skills this term. We have studied Shakespeare's famous play 'The Tempest' and one of our objectives was to use drama to recreate a scene. The pupils spent time deciding on which scene they wanted to recreate; they designed their

own puppets for the characters and created a detailed back drop for the setting. They really enjoyed performing their scenes to each other and using lots of humour to make the audience laugh!



10M have had a busy half term!

During Science week, the pupils set up their own aquarium using a straw and a bottle, they added a mixture of salt and 'sea monkeys' (brine shrimp eggs). They aerated them every day and watch them hatch, some have even gone on to investigate if different shaped bottles affect growth on a second batch of eggs.

In year 10 BTEC Science, the pupils have been learning about different chemical processes and have made plastic straws from potatoes.

They have all been working hard in Maths on concepts such as 'time' and doing a bit of drama in English. Their options are going very well (I think these are their favourite lessons).

We have won class of the week two times in a row, once for fantastic work experience. They embraced the challenge and made a great lasting impression on the employers.

Two of the pupils have started their ten tors training, walking and navigating for miles on Dartmoor without getting tired. Well done, keep it up! The girls got to go on a day trip for a neon fun run in Okehampton, they could run/walk either 2km or 5km. Great achievement girls.

Neon Run with Year 7 & 10 girls



Torbay's Healthy Holidays

Who is it for? The programme is aimed at children and young people who are attending primary or secondary schools (aged 5-16 years) who are in receipt of benefit based Free School Meals (FSM). The main aim of HAF is to reduce isolation and 'holiday hunger' for children and young people when schools are closed.







Last month Combe Pafford's Motor Vehicle Tutors took sixth form students to visit the Haynes



there.






the Haynes museum is a fantastic place to visit with a vast array of old and classic


Sixth Form Spring term news report 2022





Music news Spring term 2022

There has been lots of focus in music this term on instrumental skills and music from different cultures. Have a look at what our pupils have been up...

The Orchestra/ Music of Africa - 4N

At the beginning of the term, 4N pupils explored the sounds of an orchestra through the piece In the Hall of the Mountain King by Grieg. They enjoyed conducting each other and learning about different tempos and dynamics. In the second half of this term 4N have been learning about the music of Africa and performing simple rhythms as part of group. They really enjoyed learning the song Kye Kye Kule, which is similar to the English song Heads, shoulders, knees and toes.

<u>Inventive rhythms/ Samba Music - 5P and 5R</u>

Pupils have explored the classical music of Beethoven and Purcell, using these to invent their own rhythms and musical pieces. Pupils then created a Samba performance piece using a range of instruments from a Samba band. They have developed their call and response skills and are able to perform simple rhythms as part of a group.

Percussion music/ Reggae Music - 6E

6E pupils have explored a range of percussion instruments including using their body to create percussion sounds. They explored the piece Connect It by Anna Meredith and composed their own piece using some of her ideas. 6E have also learnt the song, Three Little Birds by Bob Marley, and they are now able to sing and perform the song. A big well done to Amy and Daisy who sang during our whole school Arts assembly recently and did a fantastic performance!

Musical instruments and Sounds / Guitar Music - Year 7

In Year 7 we have had a combination of learning the guitar and a Live Music Now project with professional musicians Hopkins Oliver. The students are familiar with naming parts of the guitar and reading tab music to help learn songs. Earlier in the term Year 7 students enjoyed exploring and playing a variety of instruments. The particular favourite was the woodwind instruments called DooDs.

Music of Africa - Year 8

Pupils in Year 8 have been learning to perform Wimoweh from The Lion King using Djembes, xylophones and glockenspiels. I've been really impressed with their rhythmic skills and ability to play in time together as part of a group.
