
We welcome Tim, a Rankins Dragon who is extremely cute and very friendly and he is already a firm favourite of most of our pupils here.

Music News

It's been a busy term in music with pupils in Year 9 celebrating Black History Month by learning about the music of Black musicians and performing some of their pieces on a range of instruments as well as developing their tuned percussion skills.

Year 8 have learnt a song about the Romans and now know the date 43AD as when the Romans came from overseas. Their confidence in singing as part of a group has grown alongside their knowledge of performing with instruments in a larger group.

Vivaldi's Winter has been a popular piece with Year 7 classes this term and pupils have adapted it to compose their own music. They have also been learning about music from the 1950s to the present day and found out some interesting facts.

Pupils in 6P have focussed their skills on singing, learning about the parts of a song and different songs around the world from Innay Capuana in Australia to the Mexican hat dance.

Year 8 visit to the Energy from Waste Centre in Plymouth<u>.</u>

We were welcomed to the Energy from Waste (EfW) centre in Plymouth by Jade who gave us lots of information about recycling at the plant then took pupils on a tour. There was lots to see.

8B travelled to Plymouth Recycling Centre. When we arrived, we all watched a video about what the centre does. Then, we completed a quiz and won a pencil made from recycled old pound notes. We put on our high visibility vests and helmets then we went on a tour of the



recycling centre. We saw the control room and a huge fire that burns rubbish to generate energy (this was our favourite part).

8N particularly enjoyed looking in the furnace at all the rubbish burning and we enjoyed looking at the computers in the controller chair. We learnt so much about how things can be recycled and have got much better at recycling in our classroom since!

8C thoroughly enjoyed the Trip to Plymouth power plant, their expectations were exceeded by the plant and how they deal with our daily waste. Their business runs seamlessly and takes all waste and turns it into power for various different business's & places. 8C were thrilled by this and by the sheer size of the plant. They have learnt & gained experience about our wider community, they thoroughly enjoyed the trip, so much so they want to go back!



8P found out lots of interesting facts about recycling at the plant and realised that they did not waste anything. Pupils took part in a quiz and discovered that 200, 000 tonnes of waste from Plymouth, Torbay and parts of Devon is sent to the Plymouth EfW plant each year - this is the same weight as 1, 053 blue whales! Pupils were given a pencil made from three old £5



notes if they answered questions correctly. They were very impressed with the "£15" pencil!



8S had a fabulous time at Plymouth EfW CHP finding out about where all our non-recyclable waste goes. Lots of children and adults still thought that lots of our waste went to landfill sites. We were really surprised to hear that not one bit of rubbish goes to waste and that the ash from burning process is used as aggregate for our roads! The children loved the viewing platform where we could see the grabber collecting and depositing the waste in to the funnel for the fire and also seeing the fire itself. The fire

could reach temperatures of 1000 degrees - as hot as lava!

Everyone is always on task and so independent that they actually tell us that the adults are a hindrance, not a help (which actually does appear to be the case sometimes). I think they deserve recognition for all of their hard work."

10K used their £30 to buy supermarket pizzas and puddings and used their Maths skills to spend every penny wisely! They held a special lunch for themselves and even used some of the reward money to buy 7H some sweets! What brilliant Role Models!?

voucher and were treated to a game of bowling at AMF Bowling on Wednesday 14th December.



10L have been working extremely hard across all subjects; they have particularly enjoyed their vocational lessons this term, taking part in lessons on Motor Vehicles, Drama, Animal Care, Independent Living Skills and Construction.

In PSHE they have been learning about money and how to budget for their lives beyond education, they have really

enjoyed planning budgets for different scenarios.

In English they have been looking at Black History and The Civil Rights Movement, they have created some fantastic pieces of writing inspired by their research and by literature by Angie Thomas and Maya Angelou.

Lego Based Therapy at Combe Pafford

This term we have been using an all new assessment grid throughout the school for Lego Therapy to cover social, emotional and speech and language needs for all pupils. There are three stages to achieve: STUDENT, APPRENTICE and MASTER BUILDER, gaining more teamwork skills and independence as pupils work through them.

There are many children doing well working towards their Student Builder certificate but a big congratulations go to: Tiggy, Cayci-Lea, Liv, Brandon and James of 9K. They have achieved the first stage so now working towards their Apprentice Builder awards.We are looking forward to more Lego builds in the New Year! Vocational Skills

Here we are, at the end of another term in vocational skills and what a varied and busy term it has been for all of the classes. All the pupils who come to vocational skills have worked so very hard this term and have made great progress with a range of skills such as plumbing, carpentry & engineering.

Within their projects pupils have been using scissors to cut string and

cardboard and then they have been using hot glue guns safely. Pupils have been measuring and cutting copper pipe and using blow torches to join copper using solder, to make wind chimes and copper coat hooks.

Pupils have been practicing using tape measures, try squares and saws to measure, mark and cut shapes from timber for their projects.



Some pupils have been thinking about strong shapes such as triangles and have then been challenged to build a platform out of quite thin timber which will carry a very heavy weight. I must say, they all succeeded and the weight stayed up. Some pupils have been using their imagination to plan and build cardboard marble jumps. I lost a lot of marbles during the testing process but it all went well and the pupils produced some interesting jumps.



Some pupils have been learning how to use battery operated drills safely and then putting their learning into practice to help them with their projects.



Throughout all of this we have been continuing our learning about Health and safety, keeping ourselves safe and what different coloured safety signs mean.

Within our lessons we have also learnt about

- Wanting to do a good job
- Working alongside others
- Patience and perseverance
- Problem solving
- How our services such as hospitals are paid for and why we pay tax.

Year 11 Work Experience – November 2022

Year 11 undertook their second work experience in November and there were some real highlights from the week. We had a range of successful placements with both old and new employers. do the animal care duties to a good standard. As а result, he has been given some paid hours in school over the Christmas holidays to look after the school animals. Well done Harvey!








have opted to do certain activities from a list that has included tennis, cycling, indoor rockclimbing, swimming, golf, olympic gymnastics, and gym work.



Students raise money for good cause











