I would like to begin by congratulating all the pupils in Years 8 and 9 for their Easter Service at St Marychurch recently, if you were one of the parents or carers lucky enough to be able to attend, you too will have been equally impressed!

Easter brings with it, not only eggs, but hopefully better weather and the opportunity to undertake trips and visits to enrich the curriculum experience we can offer to pupils. As I write this, 34 year Year 8 pupils are in Portsmouth on a residential visit, visiting some really interesting historical sites and staying in an old fort, this is the first of our residential visits this year and I am delighted so many youngsters took the opportunity as over the past couple of years we have not be able to offer many opportunities to do so. Further visits are planned next term to Wales, Dartmoor, Bristol, London, Paris and Barcelona meaning every pupil has been offered the opportunity. Beside visits, this term we have had visitors, one in particular struck a chord with adults and pupils alike, Catherine Omanyo the Head Teacher of Imprezza Academy visited us and told us of her amazing journey from homelessness to Head Teacher and MP for her region. She started up and now runs the school in Kenya, on the Uganda border, for 260 pupils, many of whom are orphans,

without Government funding. As a response, several pupils and members of staff have created some fund raising projects to raise money to provide some much needed support. We have a shopping list of needs from Catherine and at the moment we are raising money for some chickens, goats and a cow. To date, we have just over £600 which is about ¾ of the cow! We will continue fundraising next term and any help you can give, will be gratefully received.

We are saying farewell to Cathy Cole, after 19 years of service and support to Combe Pafford. Cathy has a real feel for working with pupils with needs on the autistic spectrum and each and every one she has worked with will have benefitted from being in her classes. We wish her the best of luck in the future. I wish you a happy Easter M. Lock

KS3 pupils at Combe Pafford wanted to recreate the 'burst of life' that happens when lifting a log in the back-garden of our own homes! Each year group created





Year 11 are rapidly approaching the end of their course and then we will be welcoming the EQA to visit.



## **Music news Spring term**



It's been another busy term in music with pupils in Year 9 developing their understanding of Film Music which included creating some horror music that made some of the teaching assistants very scared! They really enjoyed learning how music can affect mood and were able to compose music for a variety of emotions and film genres. They completed this topic by composing their own music to represent the story of the Titanic linking to their humanities work.



Year 8 have explored a piece of music called *Earth* by Hans Zimmer and recreated part of his music. They were very good at creating a shimmer effect using soft instruments and could control the dynamics of the music to great effect. They have also been developing their rhythm skills

this term through African drumming and have been having a competitive competition between classes to see which class is the quickest at passing a sound around the drum circle. It is currently close between 8C and 8S with them able to pass the sound around in 0.6 seconds!

In Year 7, pupils have been learning to play the guitar. They have been able to play short motifs or riffs related to known songs and also learnt how to read guitar tab.





Pupils in Year 6 have learnt how to use their body as an instrument to create sound. Following inspiration from the piece *Connect It* by Anna Meredith they created and performed a body percussion sequence as part of a group. They have also been composing their own rhythms through African drumming and are starting to use musical notation to record their ideas.

Pupils in 4N have been learning to play Boomwhackers to familiar songs and tapping along to a melody. They then moved on to learning to play a range of Samba instruments.






## **8P** News

  Do you know why? Look it up!








## 8P Enjoyed reading new books from our Reading Spine this term.

## **Torbay's Healthy Holidays**

What is HAF? HAF is a national scheme funded by the Government to ensure that children have access to food and activities over the school holiday periods. Local Authorities are required to deliver x4 hours per day for x4 days per week in one week in the Easter and Christmas holidays and x4 weeks in the summer holiday. Who is it for? The programme is aimed at children and young people who are attending primary or secondary schools (aged 5-16 years) who are in receipt of benefit based Free School Meals (FSM). The main aim of HAF is to reduce isolation and 'holiday hunger' for children and young people when schools are closed.

10W are now looking forward to residential week in June and we are researching the areas in London we will visit.




## **Vocational Skills**

## Year 11 Games









All four students deserve credit for their mature approach and the way they handled the experience.

This is such a fantastic opportunity and we wish him all the very best of luck. Have a great time Ryan!




