You will have received news that Governors have appointed a new Headteacher who will take up the post in September. Mrs Sally Banfield will be joining us in school at various times during the next term to ensure we have an effective handover and that the school continues to run smoothly during this period of change.

The new building is on track to be completed in mid-August in time for the start of the new school year. There will be a new entrance and reception area visible on entering the school site, new school offices, together with much better boys PE changing facilities and a purpose-built animal care centre. Governors have also recently been able to release funds to refurbish new toilets for the older pupils and this work will also be carried out in the summer holidays.

I am very grateful to all the staff who volunteer to attend these visits, it does require a lot of staff to give their time to ensure they go ahead and are successful.

I hope those parents and carers who were able to attend the open evening we held recently, enjoyed the opportunity to enjoy walking around the school in a relaxed manner. Thank you to those who put their names forward to be part of a Parents and Friends Support Group, we will be in contact after the Easter break via an online meeting to identify how parents can support our plan to raise funds for a new mini bus without having to attend lots of meetings, if you would like to become involved, please send your details into school for the attention of Jane Clements.

A new minibus costs in the region of £40,000 and to date £17,000 has been raised towards this.




Motor Vehicle

They have been fantastic at sorting, pricing and stocking any and all donations made to the shop.






Hadleigh Court

Year 5

Year 6

Year 6 Pupils started the term designing and making zip wires, they tested their designs in class and found that different materials and the angle of the wire created less friction making their designs zip down the line quicker. Since half term pupils in year 6 have been building on their carpentry skills using them to measure, mark and out timber in order to create iPad holders. All pupils have become more confident and accurate in their skills. They have really enjoyed using the tools and equipment in the workshop for this project.







In year 5, pupils have been learning through play to create some really exciting projects. They began this term learning about types of bridges before building their own and testing how well they could bare weight. Currently they have been learning about puppet theatres before designing their own theatre to stage their own productions on. Pupils are currently completing their theatres so they should be arriving home soon. A couple of pupils in this group have also working on their own projects. Ozzi has created a troop of Henry Hoovers out of junk modelling, which are so creative, great work!

Year 7

In year 7 pupils have been increasing their independence of carpentry skills to make wooden birdhouses. Pupils have had to measure, mark and cut very accurately following a work card to construct the designs. They have also had to research British birds in order to design the correct opening for the birds they wish to attract.

Year 8

In year 8, pupils used their skills to produce some fantastic work that really shows off their determination, planning skills, organisational skills and, their ability to stick to a job until it is completed to a high standard. Pupils have completed a clock, providing opportunities for pupils to discuss time in the context of our country and the whole world and, to use their imagination to create some really lovely bespoke clocks.













Year 9




Mother's Day cake boxes were sold to show the love for all the mums out there.

Thanks again for all your custom in the cafe, keep your eyes peeled for some more.










Music



Year 11 Lifeskills have been practicing our travel training as part of our safety outside the home unit. We've practiced lots on the bus but on Monday 18th of March we were lucky enough to be hosted by Great Western Railway as part of their 'Try a Train' scheme. We were met at Torquay station by 2 members of GWR staff who began by explaining Train Station safety. After this we went to the ticket office and all had a chance to buy our own tickets, which were kindly paid for by GWR. We then learnt about asking for stopping pattern sheets so we could track our journey on the train and how to read the information boards before boarding the train to Dawlish. After lunch we went back to Dawlish station where we learnt about Ticket offices that weren't manned during all opening hours, how to buy tickets online and practiced using the Ticket Machine. We also learnt about and practiced using the help buttons that any rail user can use to ask for help and the emergency buttons that can be used to alert staff of an emergency such as someone or an animal being on the track. The pupils used the information they had learnt to get us onto the correct platform for our journey home.

Little Chick Lemon Tarts



Ingredients

- 1 cup white sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1 cup fresh leman juice
- Zest of 2.lemons
- Vs cup butter, melted
- Frozen mini tart shells
- White sweets for the eyes
- Orange sweets for the feet and beak
- Yellow sweets for the wings

Equipment

- Baking tray
- Glers bowl
- Whisk
- Metal spoon
- Fine mesh sieve


Method

- Place the frozen tart shells on the baking tray and make holes in the bottom of them using a fork.
- 2. Bake in the oven according to the instructions.
- 3. Whilst the tarts are baking make up the rest of the ingredients.
- Combine the white sugar, eggs, lemon juice, lemon zest and butter in the bowl.
- 5. Whisk them all together until smooth.
- Heat in the microwave 1 minute at a time. Stir after every minute.
- The lemon filling is ready when it starts to cover the back of a metal spoon.
- 8. Pour the lemon filling through the sieve.
- 9. Pour in the lemon filling and leave to set.
- 10. Finally, use the sweets to decorate your chick.















